ADL. 2019 Audit of Antisemitic Incidents



2019 AUDIT OF ANTISEMITIC INCIDENTS

Each year, ADL's Center on Extremism tracks incidents of antisemitic harassment, vandalism, and assault in the United States.

2019 was an unprecedented year. ADL recorded a 12% rise in reported antisemitic incidents over the previous year—an average of six antisemitic incidents occurred in the United States every day. In ADL's 40 years of tracking antisemitic incidents, this added up to the largest number ever recorded. Of these, 37% were reported in New York and New Jersey.

EXTREMISTS INVOLVED IN NATIONWIDE PROTEST AGAINST CORONAVIRUS RESTRICTIONS

Americans' response to the coronavirus pandemic now includes a spate of nationwide rallies decrying stay-at-home orders and calling for "reopening" the economy. While many of the protests calling for the reopening of the economy and lifting of state-issued quarantine mandates have been organized by more mainstream conservative organizations, a number have been sponsored in whole or part by identified extremists and a range of rally participants have carried signs or flags affiliated with various right-wing extremist ideologies.

ADL CALLS FOR PLATFORMS TO TAKE ACTION TO ADDRESS HATE ONLINE DURING PANDEMIC

At ADL, we are watching in real time how the spread of the coronavirus is opening the doors to a new surge of online hate and bigotry targeting Jews, Asians and Asian-Americans, Muslims and immigrants, among others. We are tracking antisemitic, anti-Asian, and anti-Muslim content on Facebook and other social media platforms, and we believe the scale and speed at which these platforms operate could transform the situation from a tinderbox of hate to potential real world violence against marginalized communities.

ADL has engaged directly with private technology companies, including Facebook, about their content moderation practices during the pandemic. Many tech companies sent their human content moderation teams home, but this left their platforms to be predominantly moderated by automated systems – and often automated systems are tuned towards leniency.
